From: 179<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery Regiment Annual 1941 The 74th Field Artillery Brigade is composed of one regiment 155--mm guns, the 35th Field Artillery, and two regiments of 155--mm, howitzers, the 179th Field Artillery and the 172nd Field Artillery; and a Headquarters and Headquarters Battery.

The 35th Field Artillery was activated on February 10, 1941, at Camp Blanding, Florida, with Colonel Julian F. Barnes in Command.

The 179th Field Artillery, being a part of the Georgia National Guard, was inducted into Federal service on February 24, 1941, at Atlant, Georgia, with Colonel Thomas L. Alexander in command, and was stationed at Camp Blanding, Florida.

The 172nd Field Artillery, being a part of the New Mampshire National Guard, was inducted into Federal service on February 24, 1941, at Manchester, New Mampshire, with Colonel John Jacobson, Jr., in command, and stationed at C mp Blanding, Florida.

The Meadquarters Battery, being a wart of the Georgia Mational Guard, was inducted into Federal service on February 24, 1941, at Gainesville, Georgia, and stationed at Camp Blanding, Florida.

The 74th Field Artillery Brigade first began functioning as a brigade on May 9, 1941, at which time Brigadier General Ira T. Wyche assumed command.

### HISTORY OF THE ONE HUNDRED SEVERTY-SINTH FIELD ARTILLERY

The history of the 179th Field Artillery Regiment is largely the military history of Atlanta, starting on January 7, 1857, with the erganisation of one volunteer company, The Gate City Guard.

During the Civil War, this unit was assigned to the First Georgia Volunteers, "Ramsey's Brigade," and saw service in Florida under General Bragg and in Virginia under General Robert E. Lee and Stonewall Jackson. Severe engagements depleted the ranks and the unit was disbended; however, the remants formed an artillery unit which was present at the surrender at Appomattox. The unit was reorganised in 1870.

In 1890, the Fourth Battalion, Georgia Volumbers, was erganized in Atlanta with the Gate City Guard as a part, and on Movember 8, 1895, this unit was expanded to form the Pifth Infantry Regiment. A large part of the personnel of this regiment saw active service during the Spanish-American War.

In July, 1916, this regiment was placed on active duty en the Mexican Border, Returning to Atlanta in 1917, the regiment was sedesignated the 122nd Infantry and assigned to the 31st "Dixie" Division. It was sent to France to participate in the World War. In France, the regiment was used as replacement, and its personnel saw active duty in many engagements.

In 1920, one battalion of the 122nd Infantry was reorganised in Atlanta, and on March 5, 1924, this unit was expanded to a regiment (less one battalion), the Third Battalion being organised in Elberton, Cedartown, Calhoum and Marietta.

On July 1, 1959, the Atlanta units of the 122nd Infantry were reorganises and redesignated the 179th Field Artillery, with the entire regiment in Atlanta, and armed with the 155-mm Howitzer. The regiment was inducted into Federal service on February 24, 1941, and after one week of mebilisation in Atlanta, it moved to Camp Blanding, Florida, where it is now stationed as a part of the 74th Field Artillery Brigade, IV Army Corps, Third Army.

Attneded Primary schools in several parts of the State and graduated from Laurinburg High School, them a private school run by his uncle, the late Frank P. Wyche. Entered the United States Military Academy in 1907 and was graduated therefrom JUne 13, 1911, and assigned as Second Lieutenant to the 30th Infantry, with which he remained until October, 1916, when he was detailed in the Signal Corps and assigned to the Second Field Signal Battalion at old Fort Brown, Texas, Promoted to First Lieutenant of Infantry July 1, 1916. On January 13, 1917, he was transferred to the Field Artillery. On March 2, 1917, he left Brownsville and the Signal Corps and joined the Third Field Artillery at Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

Promoted Captain of Field Artillery May 15, 1917. When the 21st Field Artillery was formed from the Third, Captain Wyche went with the 21st Field Artillery. This Regiment was assigned to the Fifth Field Artillery Brigade, and after training at Leon Springs and Camp MoArthur, Waco, Texas, went overseas as part of the Fifth Division in May, 1918. Promoted temporary Major on June 26, 1918, and returned to the United States, assigned to the 60th Field Artillery, then training to go overseas. On July 30, 1918, he was promoted to Eiseta Lieutenant Colonel. Demotions and promotions since that time have been as follows: Reverted from temporary Lieutenant Colonel to Captain on February 9, 1920; promoted to Major July 1, 1920; Lieutenant Colonel August 1, 1935; Colonel June 1, 1940; Brigadier General (Temporary) April 7, 1941.

When the Armistice was signed he was at Camp Jackson, South Carolina, in command of the 60th Field Artillery. The last of December 1918, he was ordered to Washington to the Purchase, Storage, and Traffic Division of the General Staff. On December 1, 1919, he joined the Field Artillery Basic School at Camp Taylor, Kentucky, as instructor. Since that time he has been closely associated with the service schools. Graduated from the School of Musketry, Monterey, California; the Mounted Service School at Fort Riley; the Field Artillery School; the Command and General Staff School and the Army War College; and has been an instructor in the Field Artillery Basic School, the Field Artillery School.

Interspersed with the above duties from 1928 to 1935, he has commanded the Second Battalion, First Field Artillery and the First Battalion, 14th Field Artillery. From September, 1935, until October 1, 1938, he served on the General Staff of the Fourth Corps Area. His next duty was commanding the Second Battalion, Fourth Field Artillery at Fort Bragg, North Carolima. This command he left on June 30, 1940 and took over the Training Section of the office of the Chief of Field Artillery where he remained until promoted to Brigadier General on April 7, 1941. On May 9, 1941, he assumed command of the 74th Field Artillery Brigade.

The 122d Infantry had its origin in the Atlanta Battalion, Georgia Volunteers, formed on July 24, 1874, from the following-named existing companies:
